What I am trying to say, ever so inarticulately, is that accepting not having children has brought far less stress and anxiety to my life, and much more freedom, time for **breathing**, and moments of relaxation than that experienced by my family, friends, and coworkers who do have children. For instance, our Christmases are relatively quiet, not filled with scouring the city, the internet, and ebay frantically seeking the latest and greatest XBox whatever. I also discovered that I don't know about half of what kids "have to have" today, because I don't have to...and quite frankly, I don't care. That has been a very powerful discovery!

I now understand that sometimes things work out for the best. And, I truly believe there is a plan for each of us that we sometimes just can't understand or comprehend at the time. Your presentation was once again a reminder to me of the many joys I have in my life, each waiting for me to appreciate them. Thank you again for your wit and interactive presentation style. I thoroughly enjoyed the afternoon.
